Travel Trailer

Travel trailers are a popular RV choice, thanks to the wide variety of floor plans, models, sizes, and features. Picture an iconic Airstream, and you'll know what a travel trailer looks like. Some are even light enough to be towed with a van or midsized SUV.

Fifth Wheel

Fifth-wheel RVs are taller than conventional travel trailers, with a raised front section that rests over the bed of a pickup truck. For this reason, they require a dually or heavy-duty truck for towing. Not all campsites accommodate trailers of this size, and they are generally less nimble to tow and park.


Do you want a motorized RV?

Motorized RVs don't require a tow vehicle—the driver's seat is right inside the RV itself. Some motorized RVs allow you to tow a vehicle or trailer behind. They offer you the convenience of being inside your home away from home as soon as you park, no hitching or unhitching required.



Class A

Class A RVs are the largest in this category, typically offering separate bedrooms. The biggest Class A RVs are the size of tour buses.



Class B

Class B RVs are more akin to vans. They can range from basic to luxurious; some even have separate enclosed bathrooms. Airstream offers a range of Touring Coaches, each built with Airstream's quality and attention to detail.



Class C

Class C RVs are built on cab or truck chassis, with an elevated sleeping space over the cab and living area in the remaining interior.

RV TERMINOLOGY

As you read descriptions and reviews, you'll likely come across some unfamiliar phrases. This is RVing 101, but if you still feel unsure, jot some notes and take them along during your dealer visit, which we'll talk about next. The one thing you surely understand already? Anticipation.





Boondocking Camping without electrical, sewer, or water hookups

Caravan A group of Airstreamers traveling together

Chocks

Accessories placed under the wheels to prevent a travel trailer from rolling

Dual Axle Travel trailers that have two sets of wheels

Dump Station

A place where you can empty your waste and gray water tanks

Fresh Water

Clean water for drinking or bathing

Full Hookups Campsites that provide water, electricity, and sewer connections

Galley An RV's onboard kitchen

Gray Water

Waste water from the sink and shower

Holding Tanks Your fresh, gray, and waste water tanks

Lavy

The stand-alone toilet and sink area when separate from the shower

Leveling

Making an RV level with the ground below by placing levelers under the wheels or using built-in manual or power jacks or power-leveling jacks

Pull-Through

A campsite that allows you to drive in from one side and out the other without needing to back up

Rig

Another name for a truck and trailer combo

Shore Power

Connecting your RV into the AC power grid. The two most common campsite connections are 30-amp and 50-amp hookups

Single Axle

Travel trailers that have one set of wheels

Slide

A portion of an RV that expands to allow more interior space when parked

Stabilizer Jack

A built-in manual or power device that keeps your RV steady when walking through it after you've leveled it

ΤV

Tow Vehicle

Waste Water

Sometimes referred to as black water, it is solid and liquid waste from the toilet

Wet Bath

A bathroom in which the shower and toilet are in one place, and the entire area is designed to get wet (for space efficiency)

O4 AT THE DEALERSHIP

Buying an Airstream is the opposite of an impulse purchase, with time spent perusing blogs, joining social media groups, studying brochures, and weighing the options.

But after gazing longingly at each Airstream that passes by on the highway and prying details out of every owner you meet, it's time for the next exciting step: to head to your local dealer for an up-close look at your future dream come true.

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Getting the most from a **dealer visit**

It pays to read online reviews of the sales and service teams of the dealerships you're considering. Stop in and find a friendly face that feels like a good fit for you and your family.

If you're choosing between multiple models, call ahead to ensure they have those models available for you to walk through. Open cabinets, wardrobes, and roof lockers to get a sense of the differences in hardware, finishes, and storage capacity. Ask about available optional features. You may end up changing your mind based on what you learn about features offered in other model lines.

Pay attention to surfaces, flooring, fixtures, fabrics, and countertops. Often, these features are what sets one Airstream apart from another. Take a tape measure. Being able to compare dimensions and recall them later is helpful when considering your travel necessities, whether that's a dog crate or a mountain bike.

Take photos and videos and make notes. Be sure you can reassemble which photos and videos go with which notes after you leave.



Get inside as many Airstreams as you can! Like a box of chocolates, where you don't know what you've got until you take a bite, it can be hard to tell the differences until you step inside.

Smart steps before a follow-up visit

Make a list of any remaining questions for the dealer:

- What optional features are included in this Airstream?
- What does the warranty cover?
- What does yor service plan look like?
- Can I access service from other dealers as well? (Ask about Airstream's Five-Rivet Dealer program.)
- What do people like most about this Airstream?
- Discuss financing with your bank or the dealer, if necessary.
- Join online forums or Facebook groups to see what people are saying and which options they're choosing.





What to expect after the purchase

While it's certainly possible to buy an Airstream and head off the lot with it in tow, conventional wisdom suggests that the process is less like buying a new car and more like buying a new house.

The more time you can spend in your new Airstream before you head home, the better. walk-through of all of the systems. It's a great idea to have your phone handy to take videos as the dealer delivers a tutorial so you can remember the little details later.

Expect your dealer to conduct a full

Film each major step or system as a separate video, so you know exactly where to go when you need a refresher. After you film your dealer's instructions, give each step a go on your own. Watching is very different from doing. (If you need a refresher, there are how-to videos for each Airstream model at airstream.com.)



During this walk-through, your dealer will test all the systems, ensuring that all the outlets are working, the water heater is heating water, and the furnace and air conditioner operate as they should.

Don't skip the small stuff; if you run into any snags, the dealer can repair them before you take delivery. Keep a punch list, just as you would during a walkthrough of a new home.

What to Expect



If you're purchasing a unit that's been winterized, you'll want to arrange a time to go over the systems in the spring. Above all, try to keep the lines of communication open. Dealers have heard all kinds of questions, and none of them are dumb!





Take it for a test run

This is where the rubber meets the road—ideally, not too far from the dealership. Some dealerships will have an adjacent space where you can camp in your new unit for a night or two to make sure all systems are go. Sometimes, a dealer will let you camp in their parking lot.

If those aren't options that work for you, find a park nearby where you can try your Airstream before you set your sights on your first grand adventure. Keep in mind that unlike a car, your new home on the range will settle a bit. This is a good way to work out the kinks.

How to travel with your Airstream

Experienced Airstreamers will tell you that the best course of action is to camp close to home on your first trip. There's a benefit to following the process through from start to finish: hitching up your new Airstream, making your way out of the neighborhood, merging onto the highway, and navigating through a campground.

If you're new to towing, there are numerous videos on YouTube demonstrating parking, hitching, turning, and backing up. Just remember to take it slow, make wider-than-normal turns, brake sooner than you otherwise would, and drive at a slower, more consistent speed.

Look for campsites with power, water, and sewer hookups for your first trip. When in doubt, try to interact one on one with the campground owner ahead of your trip. Many are super helpful and can put your mind at ease with a quick email or text. Another great bit of advice: Choose campsites with pull-through access, removing the added stress of backing into a spot on your first trip.

Campsite reservations are almost always a must anymore. Fortunately, you have the power to see a site's amenities and RSVP at your fingertips. Countless apps now make it simple to map your route; find food, fuel, and facilities along the way; or even track down solid Wi-Fi and wacky roadside attractions.

Your first trip is a good time to learn how to level your Airstream and extend the stabilizing jacks, as well as hook up your fresh water hose, your shore power cord, and your sewer hose. This is also a great time to get acquainted with the process of extending your awning (make sure you bring along your owner's manual).



If you get confused or stumped, take a walk around the campsite. More than likely, other RVers will be happy to help answer your questions.

These first days and nights are all about exploration. Play with the light switches. Learn how to turn on the furnace and A/C. Read about power systems as you figure out exactly what the inverter does and the voltage of the different outlets. Take a shower while you're hooked up to city water so you don't have to worry about filling your tanks. Learn how to turn on the water heater and water pump.


